## PROCEEDINGS OF THE SEVENTH EAST ASIAN SEAS (EAS) SENIOR GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS' MEETING (SGOM) Preparatory Meeting for the Seventh EAS Ministerial Forum

### 25 November 2021 Zoom Meeting

#### INTRODUCTION

- i. The Seventh East Asian Seas (EAS) Senior Government Officials' Meeting (SGOM) was held on 25 November 2021 via Zoom. Senior Government Officials from 11 PEMSEA Country Partners participated in the meeting, namely: Cambodia, PR China, DPR Korea, Indonesia, Japan, Lao PDR, Philippines, RO Korea, Singapore, Timor-Leste and Viet Nam. The PEMSEA Resource Facility (PRF) served as the Secretariat for the Meeting.
- ii. Dr. Keita Furukawa, Technical Session Co-Chair of the EAS Partnership Council, chaired the Meeting on behalf of Dr. Vu Thanh Ca, Intergovernmental Session Co-Chair of the EAS Partnership Council.
- iii. The full list of participants is found in Annex 1.

#### 1.0 OPENING OF THE SGOM

- 1.1 Ms. Aimee Gonzales, Executive Director of the PEMSEA Resource Facility welcomed all the delegates on behalf of the PEMSEA Resource Facility. Ms. Gonzales expressed her appreciation to all the Country Partners for their support in the preparations for the EAS Congress 2021 and the 7th EAS Ministerial Forum, particularly in securing high-level participation to the Ministerial event. With less than a week left before the 7th EAS Ministerial Forum, she emphasized the crucial role of the SGOM in finalizing the 7th EAS Ministerial Declaration for endorsement and signature by country heads of delegation on 02 December 2021. Recognizing the recent conclusion of the UNFCCC COP26, Ms. Gonzales further requested the SGOM to provide guidance if reference on the Glasgow Climate Pact would need to be reconsidered in the draft Ministerial Declaration. She, however, emphasized that should PEMSEA countries find it premature to include in the Declaration, further consideration on the relevant commitments on the Glasgow Climate Pact would be further discussed for consideration in the development of the Sustainable Development Strategy for the Seas of East Asia (SDS-SEA) Implementation Plan 2023-2027, which is scheduled to be developed in collaboration with PEMSEA Partners, networks and collaborators in 2022.
- 1.2 On behalf of the PEMSEA Executive Committee, Dr. Keita Furukawa, expressed his appreciation and welcomed the Senior Government Officials in the meeting. Dr.

Furukawa highlighted that for the first time since the onset of the pandemic two years ago, the 11 PEMSEA Country Partners are complete and well represented at the SGOM. Echoing Ms. Gonzales' message, Dr. Furukawa urged the SGOM to actively participate in the discussion, particularly in the finalization of the 7<sup>th</sup> EAS Ministerial Declaration and expressed hope that consensus would be reached and that the objectives set by the SGOM would be met by the end of the meeting.

- 1.3 The Secretariat presented the agenda and schedule of the Meeting.
- 1.4 The agenda as adopted by the Meeting is found in Annex 2.

#### 2.0 FINAL REVIEW OF THE MINISTERIAL DECLARATION (SGOM7/DOC/02)

- 2.1 Ms. Gonzales provided an overview of the process undertaken as part of the review and consensus-building process, as well as the key considerations which guided the drafting of the 7th Ministerial Declaration. In particular, Ms. Gonzales emphasized that 3 rounds of consultations with Country, Non-Country Partners, and the Executive Committee have been completed. All throughout the process, the Secretariat was guided by the following key considerations:
  - The need to ensure brevity or succinctness of statements
  - Ensure use of clear and internationally accepted/defined terminologies
  - Highlight key reference to relevant key global commitments adhered to by EAS countries, but omit instruments undergoing deliberations in order to avoid preempting results
  - Highlight PEMSEA's achievements and strengths (particularly on regional cooperation, ICM, Blue Economy, and knowledge and capacity building)
  - Recognize persistent and emerging regional challenges in EAS region, including impacts of the global pandemic
  - Highlight support to PEMSEA Roadmap 2030 focusing on four key strategic objectives (Effective Governance, Healthy Ocean, Healthy People, and Healthy Economies). Whereas detailed Roadmap and SDS-SEA Implementation Plan 2023-2027 will be done separately
  - State a Call for Action covering recognition and support to the PRF, strengthened partnerships and commitment to green recovery
- 2.2 Building on the 4<sup>th</sup> draft of the Ministerial Declaration which was circulated to all Country Partners from November 2 to 17, 2021, Ms. Gonzales presented the comments and inputs generated from the last consultation process, and provided corresponding proposed actions from the PRF to guide the SGOM deliberations.
- 2.3 Following the presentation, the SGOM Chair facilitated the final review process by going over the paragraphs requiring further review and confirmation. In each

item, the Chair requested for country inputs, confirmation or alternative suggestions. The result of the SGOM review is captured in the following table:

2.4 Following the detailed review, the Chair secured the final confirmation from each country on the final draft Declaration. All 11 countries have confirmed their concurrence to the final draft, taking into consideration the final edits as provided and agreed to by the SGOM. The SGOM formally endorsed the revised final draft for adoption or signature at the 7<sup>th</sup> EAS Ministerial Forum on December 2, 2021.

- 2.5 In line with the endorsement by the SGOM, the Chair further requested the PEMSEA Secretariat to finalize and format the Ministerial Declaration together with the complete signature pages for onward transmission to all countries in preparation for the 7<sup>th</sup> Ministerial Forum.
- 2.6 The full final draft Declaration with revisions from the SGOM is found in Annex 3.

## 3.0 7<sup>th</sup> EAS MINISTERIAL FORUM PROGRAM AND ARRANGEMENTS (SGOM7/DOC/03b)

- 3.1 Ms. Kathrine Rose G. Aguiling, PEMSEA Consultant for the 7<sup>th</sup> MF, presented the final program and arrangements for both the 7<sup>th</sup> Ministerial Forum and the Press Conference. Both scheduled on December 2, 2021. In particular, she highlighted the two key agenda items of the Forum: (a) delivery of Country Statements; and (b) signing of the Ministerial Declaration.
- 3.2 On the signing of the Ministerial Declaration, the following guidance were provided to the countries:
  - Final copies will be provided to all countries together with the signature page
  - Each country will print three copies in color for signature at the 7<sup>th</sup> MF; 2 copies will be submitted back to the PEMSEA Secretariat after the 7<sup>th</sup> MF, while 1 copy will be retained in each PEMSEA Focal Ministry
  - Black sign pen will be used for signature
  - (More detailed guidelines will be shared by the PEMSEA Secretariat to all countries after the SGOM, together with the final and laid out 7<sup>th</sup> EAS Ministerial Declaration)
- 3.3 On the conduct of the virtual MF, the SGOM were reminded that individual country zoom links as we well as other administrative and logistical reminders have already been provided via the 7<sup>th</sup> MF Advisory that was released to all countries in advance. While countries who will require simultaneous interpretation were requested to register their interpreters separately and coordinate directly with the Secretariat.
- 3.4 All Country Partners who have yet to submit their respective Country Statements were also reminded to submit copies to the PRF together with their supporting visuals, if any. Country Teams were also requested to join the rehearsals scheduled on November 29 and 30, 2021.

## 4.0 FINAL CONFIRMATION OF COUNTRY DELEGATION FOR THE 7<sup>TH</sup> MF (SGOM7/DOC/04)

- 4.1 Ms. Aguiling provided an update on the status of confirmation of country delegations for the 7<sup>th</sup> Ministerial Forum. She highlighted that the heads of delegation from all 11 countries have already confirmed. The list as of 24 November 2021 is found in Annex 4.
- 4.2 To facilitate better preparation, all Country Partners were requested to brief their respective heads of delegation on the program flow and requirements.

#### 5.0 CLOSING OF THE 7th EAS SGOM

The SGOM Chair expressed his appreciation and congratulated all the country representatives for reaching consensus on the 7th Ministerial Declaration which will serve as the region's new commitment document in support of the Global Sustainable Development Agenda as well as a response to the Decade of Ocean Science and Ecosystem Restoration. Moreover, he expressed gratitude to the Ministry of Environment of Cambodia who has been working full time together with the PRF to ensure smooth arrangements for the 7th Ministerial Forum. The Chair reminded all the countries to coordinate closely with the PEMSEA Secretariat and actively participate in the remaining preparatory activities leading to the 7th Ministerial Forum. In closing, he wished everyone good health and safety. The SGOM Chair declared the meeting officially adjourned at 12noon of 25 November 2021 (Manila time).

# ANNEX 3 FINAL DRAFT 7<sup>TH</sup> EAS MINISTERIAL DECLARATION (SGOM REVISIONS REFLECTED)

#### PREAH SIHANOUK MINISTERIAL DECLARATION ADVANCING OUR SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT AGENDA: ROAD TO 2030 FOR HEALTHY OCEAN, PEOPLE, AND ECONOMIES

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We, the Official Government Representatives of eleven countries bordering the Seas of East Asia, have virtually gathered this 2nd day of December 2021 to review the progress and scale up good practices in implementing the Sustainable Development Strategy for the Seas of East Asia; chart our actions in the new decade to achieve our vision of healthy ocean, people, and economies; and respond to the global call for a green recovery strategy post COVID-19 pandemic.

We recognize that the COVID-19 pandemic has led to a global crisis that disrupted trade, travel, tourism, and fisheries industries, plunging national economies across the region and affecting the lives and livelihood of the people.

We underline the need to address the impacts of COVID-19 by implementing green recovery plans, driven by a robust Blue Economy that boosts employment and equitable growth, and brings transformation towards responsible consumption, production and investment, while protecting our natural capital, enhancing resource efficiency and resiliency, and reducing carbon footprint.

We reaffirm our commitment to Blue Economy made in the Changwon Declaration in 2012 and Climate action under the Manila Declaration in 2009, and support the global efforts to achieve the goals of the Paris Agreement, with mitigation and adaptation as crucial underlying principles in our strategies and actions to accelerate Blue Economy and Sustainable Development.

We have taken initiatives to protect our coastal and ocean ecosystems from the impacts of climate change, marine pollution and other unsustainable patterns of resource use, mindful of the ecosystem services that it provides, including hosting nine of the world's busiest container-shipping seaports, producing 80% of the world's aquaculture and 40 million tons of annual fish catch, and supporting a third of the world's coral reefs, mangroves and seagrass beds.

We have achieved our targets set in the Danang Compact 2015, specifically 1) the completion of a regional State of Oceans and Coasts (SOC) and ten National SOC reports on Blue Economy, 2) scaling up of integrated coastal management (ICM) covering an estimated 40 percent of the region's coastline and contiguous watershed areas, surpassing the 25 percent target coverage by 2021; and 3) facilitating the formulation, adoption, and implementation of policies, action plans and programs on coastal, rivers, associated watershed areas and ocean ecosystems.

We recognize PEMSEA as a model for regional ocean governance and partnerships, and reaffirm the SDS-SEA as the regional framework of commitments for collaborative and

inclusive actions, thus providing PEMSEA with the essential institutional foundation to help countries achieve global and regional commitments in the UN Sustainable Development Goals, UN Framework Convention on Climate Change and the Paris Agreement, Convention on Biological Diversity, and Sendai Framework, which were confirmed through the Danang Compact and the Iloilo Declaration.

We welcome the proclamation of the UN Decade of Ocean Science for Sustainable Development (2021-2030), the UN Decade of Ecosystem Restoration, and the UNEA-4 Ministerial Declaration and support the global efforts in facilitating access to ocean science data and information to support science-informed coastal and ocean policies and interventions.

We are grateful to our non-country partners, development partners, collaborators, and donors; the PEMSEA networks of local governments, learning institutions, and youth; as well as non-government organizations, local communities, private sector and the media, which continue to support PEMSEA in achieving the SDS-SEA vision and goals.

#### **PEMSEA ROADMAP TO 2030**

We support the PEMSEA Roadmap 2030, which is anchored on SDS-SEA's vision and will complement PEMSEA Countries' green recovery plans. We commit to guide and work with the PEMSEA Resource Facility in the development of the PEMSEA Roadmap 2030 and the SDS-SEA Implementation Plan 2023-2027, based on the following regional priorities:

- 1. EFFECTIVE GOVERNANCE. Improve policies for mainstreaming ICM and adopt relevant tools and mechanisms that will support an integrated, coordinated, inclusive and science-based decision making process; and strengthen institutional, technical and resource capacities by adopting innovative financing mechanisms and generating knowledge and regional best practices on river, coasts and ocean management through learning and technology exchange platforms, science research and information management initiatives.
- 2. HEALTHY OCEAN. Scale up ICM as a proven sustainable management approach to strengthen coastal resilience and protect the health of river, coasts and ocean ecosystems and related natural resources, as well as coastal communities from the threats and impacts of climate change, land-based pollution, including marine litter and debris, unsustainable activities and practices, and other unsustainable patterns of use that lead to environmental degradation and biodiversity loss.
- 3. **HEALTHY PEOPLE.** Engage the community as responsible and effective stewards and enhance their capacities to protect and sustainably use and

- manage coastal, ocean and water resources thereby facilitating food security and nutrition, access to livelihood opportunities and better quality of life.
- 4. HEALTHY ECONOMIES. Accelerate blue investments and ensure sustainable and efficient utilization of coastal and ocean ecosystems, and related resources, to support green recovery initiatives that will generate jobs, livelihood and enterprises within ecological limits, towards contributing to the countries' sustainable economic development.

#### **CALL FOR ACTION**

We recognize the importance of the PEMSEA Resource Facility as the coordinating and enabling mechanism for the implementation of the SDS-SEA, which is aligned with the global goals that EAS Countries have signed to. We further assure the PRF of our continued voluntary contributions and technical support in sustaining partnerships in the region and call on our partners, local governments, private sector, academe, youth network, non-governmental organizations, financing institutions, and the international community to extend the necessary assistance to enable PRF to build regional capacities, facilitate knowledge exchange and leverage technical expertise, skills and resources for the sustainable management of coastal and ocean ecosystems.

COVID 19 continues to pose a challenge to the people and the environment. As the world adjusts and works to manage the pandemic resulting in economic crisis, PEMSEA should take the opportunity to support the green recovery to build back better and healthier ocean, people, and economies.
